Sometimes profound change occurs when and how we least expect it. For instance, up until the late 1700's cotton was expensive to produce in the U.S. The inventors of the cotton gin, thought that their contraption would reduce the need for slave labor because far few people would be needed to pick the seeds out of the cotton. Unfortunately, the number of southern slaves and plantations increased dramatically after the invention of the cotton gin made it much cheaper and easier to produce.

From the President (That'd Be Chris)

Chris would like to bring three items to everyone's attention.

Chinese and Indian commodities. In 1492, they finally pushed the last of the moors out and Columbus thought he found the orient. For the next 200 years, Spain became arguably the most powerful and wealthy European country when it figured out how to work with a dramatically different reality than Columbus could imagine.

Our speaker this week, James Chesser, may be at the cusp of some similarly dynamic changes. You may remember his impassioned speech at one of our semi-annual parties about his trips to China and his efforts to export democracy and possibly Christianity; his descriptions of how people's face lit up at the mere suggestion that have worth and rights as an individual outside their national identity.

While no one is predicting a mass conversion of the Chinese to Christianity, changes could be afloat in the legal underpinnings of our economy. The American economic model is built on the ability of someone to own something and derive value from that something because of individual legal rights we give them in ownership The most stunning examples of these concepts are the huge amounts of wealth created for Microsoft and its one user one license approach to software as well as for individual mega stars and writers in Country Music, Rock and Roll, Movies, etc. These models have been successful because we have had a few million people accept the idea and go along with it.

What if the world's potentially largest market, one that has the ability to utterly dwarf ours in size, is culturally incapable of going along with this idea of individual ownership for the next 100 years? We cannot force them to abide by our approach. We cannot even force our own high school and college kids to abide by "the rules."

For those of you who do not know James well, he has an interesting history. A native of Canada, his first degree is a Bachelor and Master of Arts in Advanced Physics, from Trinity College, Cambridge University, U. K. He then spent time as a rough neck in the oil business in the Arctic Circle. He has also studied Electrical Engineering at Yale, served as an assistant conductor for the Charlottesville Symphony Orchestra, in Virginia, and received his JD from the University of Virginia.
